This review gives me a chance to look back at all the wonderful activities that our Group has taken part in over the last year, all organised and run by an amazing group of leaders across our Scout Group.

As well as the excellent weekly programme put on by each section it has been great to see large numbers of our Group participating in District competitions, Remembrance Day and St George's Day parades, the latter being hosted by 3rd Esher Scout Group, the newest Scout Group in Esher District. This year saw the return of our traditional Group camp, at Walton Firs, which despite the wet finish was another huge success. This was not surprising given the large number of activities that all attendees had the chance to try out, including our new inflatable football dart board.

Unfortunately due to the lack of enough leaders we were unable to attend Scoutabout or camp at the District Cub camp, although we did attend as day visitors, giving our Cubs the chance to take part in all the activities that had been laid on by ourselves as well as other Groups across Esher District.

To finish the Scouting year our Scouts had a great Scout summer camp in the New Forest, with excellent weather throughout the week as well as lots of leaders there to help, all of whom also had a great time trying new activities.

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The camp also included a Bronze DofE expedition, the first one for a while. This was very much thanks to the organisation of Sarah Wright and Jules Smillie who have kicked off the DofE awards again for our Scouts and Explorers.

I won't mention the trip home from camp, as this wasn't one of my finest moments in Scouting.

As always, I would like to say a huge thanks to all the leaders for coming up with so many engaging program ideas throughout the year, teaching our members new skills for life and encouraging them to make a positive contribution to society as they grow up. We also should not forget how much time each leader gives to Scouting, not just for the running of the activities but also the time spent planning, doing training and for some using up their holiday to take our Scouts away to Summer Camp. Please take any opportunity that you can to say thanks to our leaders, as like everyone else they have to also provide this leadership alongside their normal jobs and family life.

Our Scout Group continues to flourish with all sections being at capacity, with long waiting lists to get in. This is down to the great job we do as a Group, providing an exciting program to all our members and helping Scouting remain as the UK's largest co-educational youth movement.

We have had a few new leaders join us over the last year and have a few more adults showing interest in joining our fantastic team, however we would always welcome more help. If you think that this is something that you might be interested in, then please get in touch and come along to give it a go. I think I can safely say that all our leaders not only find this very rewarding but also have great fun too.

Thanks to an excellent leader training programme, there is no pre-requisite in expertise or experience. All leaders undertake their initial leader training within five months of appointment and their full training within five years. They then undergo ongoing training throughout their service, keeping them up to date in areas such as safety, safeguarding and first aid. Those becoming leaders and taking on certain other roles may bypass the considerable waiting lists for membership of the sections for their children.

A continuing challenge for the volunteer leader team is delivering ever more sophisticated programmes requiring specialised training and qualifications such as archery, shooting and water and mountain-based activities. Despite the restrictions imposed on us over the last year it is good to report that many of our leaders and instructors have continued to develop their skills, with the Scout Association quickly developing online training modules for many areas especially for Safety and Safeguarding which has become a key focus for all adults involved in Scouting. Developing personal skills and then passing them on to young people is a very rewarding aspect of a leader's role.

Whilst we will be presenting many long service awards at this year's AGM I have to make special mention of the one to Adrian Ducker, my predecessor as Group Scout Leader. Adrian has not only been awarded the Silver Wolf, the highest award in Scouting, for service of an exceptional nature,

but he has also achieved his 50 year service award. These are truly outstanding achievements and fully deserved for his fantastic dedication over such a long time.

Our activities teams are strengthened by the addition of Explorers and Network scouts joining the coaching teams. It is fantastic to see young people making use of the knowledge and experience gained through Scouting by putting something back into the movement.

Closely supporting the uniformed team is the Group Exec, now renamed as the Trustee Board and fundraising sub-team, the teams whose function is to support the Group in its work. The greatest part of this involves fundraising and our financial report shows just how important the fundraising effort is to our overall income. It is thanks to all the hard work done by this team that we have been able to purchase new tents and also subsidise some of the camp costs for our members.

We are now fundraising for a new minibus as neither of ours are ULEZ compliant and the silver one is starting to look a little tired after the many activities that it has also been on!

Whilst my thanks go to all of these team members and the many parents who have helped throughout the year in any capacity, I would especially like to call out Jacqui Signor, Sunita Govind and Katie Sweeting. Jacqui has done an amazing job as our Group chair, keeping us all in order, Sunita ensuring that all our finances are in the best health and Katie for her many years of managing our Christmas tree fundraising. Katie has now stood down from this role, having done this job for over 10 years, so we are in need of someone to step forward and take up the mantle from Katie, who is more than happy to help mentor them.

Sadly both of our Explorer leaders, John Daoud and Debbie Shaw, have decided that it is time to take on new challenges and finish their current roles within our leader team. John has been a leader for over 17 years, 14 of them within the Explorer section, and Debbie almost 8 years. They have contributed hugely to our Group planning and leading some excellent activities, John with his fantastic Scouting skills and Debbie with her amazing organisational skills. I could write pages on what they have achieved for our Group but have been told to keep my report concise, so will just say a huge thanks and that they will be sorely missed. Whilst John has stepped down as Explorer Leader I am pleased that he has agreed to stay on as our Water Activities leader, one that he excels in. We are now on the lookout for new Explorer leaders as the next group of Scouts move up into Explorers for the next chapter in their Scouting careers.

Our current objectives are to attract more leaders; to train more in specialist roles and to encourage more parents to get involved in managing the Group and the joint headquarters. There are still plenty of opportunities to support your Group so please let me or any of our Trustees/ Parent Representatives know if you can help in any way. Whilst many of these roles involve evening and weekend participation there are a number of other roles that will help reduce the workload on the leaders. Our Group has always relied on parents to take an active part in the running of the Group as it is entirely dependent on volunteers.

We hope you enjoy this Annual Review. I am grateful to all the contributors and especially to Jacqui Signor for again producing this year's edition. We have included summary financial information in an easily understood graphical format however the full detailed trustees' annual report and accounts are available to anyone who requests them. Please help to promote our Group and our achievements by sharing this review around the area, such as within other organisations, schools, libraries, doctors' waiting rooms.

We welcomed several new beavers over the course of the year and all settled in well. During the Autumn term we worked on the Builders, Community Impact, Health and Fitness and My World Challenge badges. Beavers designed their own vehicle from recyclable materials which could then race down a ramp and travel along the hut floor. We had many interesting creations with varying degrees of success! As part of the Community Impact badge, the Beavers went along to the Fire Station in Esher. The Beavers were impeccably behaved and thoroughly enjoyed the station and engine tour. We also filled a shoebox with essentials and Christmas presents for local charity Besom which supports local families in need. For Health and Fitness, beavers took on the Hut Tucker Trial, trying various different fruits from Dragon fruit, to Lychees, Passion fruit and Melon.

During the Spring term, beavers worked on the Disability Awareness, Experiment, Collectors and Skills Challenge badges. Beavers learnt about the different challenges people with disabilities experience, had great fun making oobleck, alka seltzer rockets and watching the swirls in dye with washing up liquid in milk. We saw some amazing collections and learnt new skills, including the least favourite activity... knots!

The summer term meant being outside as much as possible, doing the Navigator, Safety, Adventure Challenge and Money Skills badges (we needed an indoor badge just in case the weather didn't play ball...). Beavers learnt about how to be safe - including learning the Green Cross code, went on a hike up Telegraph Hill, put up tents and toasted marshmallows around a campfire they helped to build. We also had two parent helpers explain about money and beavers had fun designing their own currencies. There was also Group Camp at Walton Firs, which was a first for many of our Beavers, and a first overnight stay with the Scouts too - everyone had a great time and all returned home suitably tired and muddy!

We had a mega year for Bronze Awards - over eight being awarded. All the leaders were super-impressed by the effort that each of the beavers put in with their personal and leader challenges, as well as the commitment they have shown over the two years at Beavers. Congratulations to them all.

Across the year, we played lots of our favourite games, such as Knights and Dragons, Jump the River, Hockey, Crab football, Space Invaders, tag and relays. We also had fun doing lots of cooking activities - making cheesecake truffles, mug cakes, pancakes and Victoria sponges.

We attended two district parties - the first in February centred around The Wizard of Oz finished with a theatrical performance from the Cats Grin, and the second a summer pirate themed party. We rounded out our year with a great trip to Go Ape in Chessington.

Another great year down - good luck to those moving up to Cubs and we look forward to welcoming a new set of faces in September. Thanks to all the parents who volunteered and as always we are on the lookout for more helpers and leaders - please do spread the word.

It's been another fun year with Hinchley Wood Explorers, we have retained a good number of explorer scouts from last year and have had more move up in the Summer. The Explorer meeting is held on Monday evening from 7-9 pm. Lots of help is required urgently to keep this unit going into 2024/25.

We have had a busy year with a number of district events that include the district back-woods cooking competition at Claygate scout centre coming second. We attended a fencing taster session at Morden, receiving coaching for a member of the GB team. We supported the Scout fireworks night, setting up a spectacular firework display and bonfire. We attended an indoor carpet bowls session in Chessington, ice skating at Hampton court palace as well as ten pin bowls at Tolworth. In December (when else) we had the Explorer Christmas meal, attended by over 30 Explorers and Explorer alumni. In the spring meetings we have attended top golf and had a number of relaxed evenings playing table tennis, darts and quizzing. A fun and educational self defence session with Pedro, a number of cooking evenings and the highlight with the help of Sunita we had a masterclass in Indian cooking. Our first qualifying team powering through at top speed on their final day to finish early and even making homemade snacks to eat during the trip in the Surrey Hills. The latest team from Scouts improved so much navigational wise from their practice in the Surrey Hills to navigating like experts through complicated areas of the New Forest during Summer Camp for their qualifying expedition in an area that is really Silver DofE country. The difference in both teams between practice and qualifying is immense and we are so very proud of how they have acted and remained positive throughout the challenge. Hopefully the smiles at the end were symbolic of their achievement and that they have lasting memories to make them smile for years to come of their walks.

Our thanks go to Emma Wilson for arranging the cookery course for the skills section and to all the parents who helped with supporting the kids, driving them to practice walks, checkpointing in the Surrey Hills and helping with the cooking and training sessions. Special thanks to Jacqui Signor for camping with me for the expedition in the Surrey Hills. We couldn't have done it without your support.

This year we are running Bronze again for anyone who has started in year 9 or above and are also running Silver for those who have started in year 10 or above. Please speak to the leaders or myself (I'll be at the various sections to visit) and we can get them signed up if they would like to participate. There really is something for everyone in the award, and they can all do it in a way that is unique to them.

If there are any parents that could spare some time to help out with being a DofE leader/helper, we would really appreciate it....there are loads of small things that would really help – from the expeditions, helping with skills/volunteering, to some admin with the eDofE. It really has been great fun doing this for the young people this year and any help/time would be appreciated. Please just speak to one of the leaders to get in touch with me to discuss it.

Lastly I'd like to say well done to all the young people who have done their Bronze awards this year, we are very proud of them and they should be immensely proud of what they have achieved.



Scout & Guide Joint Management Committee, Sue Rodger

The Joint Management Committee (JMC) is the body responsible for the development, maintenance, and management of our headquarters which is jointly owned and occupied by Girlguiding Hinchley Wood and 1st Hinchley Wood Scout Group, together with the separately leased open space. Together with the Scout Group we have contacted Elmbridge BC regarding combining the leases for the land the HQ is built on and the grass area. The lease on the grass area runs out Dec 2024. We are still in discussions with Elmbridge and had a meeting with Chris Francis, Estates Surveyor at Elmbridge Borough Council in May. It is unlikely we will be able to combine the leases but should be able to renew the lease on the grass area for a longer period. We will be chasing Elmbridge this month to get a decision. I would like to thank everyone who has provided advice on this and to Katherine who has been involved in ongoing discussions with the council.

The JMC includes Leader representation, but the main executive roles should be held by Scout and Guide Parents. We are looking for two new people to join the committee as Karen is stepping down from the committee at the end of September as her son has finished his scouting journey.

Sadly, our independent treasurer, Robert Fulton died earlier this year. We are therefore looking for a new Treasurer. The person who takes this role should be independent of the Scout and Guide groups.

There will be specific projects that require a team approach. Thank you to the parents who have stepped up to help on this committee.

We derive income from the Guides and Scouts quarterly contributions and occasional lettings for children's parties. The per capita levy is £10 a head. We are entering into discussions with Elmbridge Borough Council planning dept about letting the hall to more regular weekday daytime hirers.

Everyday expenses are utility bills, building insurance and maintenance as per our ongoing schedule for redecoration, floor sealing, hedge trimming and grass cutting.

As always, a lot of work is needed to maintain and improve our HQ for the benefit of users. Parental help is always appreciated, such as at our twice yearly clean up days.

Major works are usually dependant on successful grant applications or other funding being made available as regular income will not cover this expenditure. We applied for CIL funding for the roof work and thanks to Katherine and Karen we were successful, and Elmbridge Borough Council awarded the JMC/Scout Group £15k towards the roof work.

We are currently looking into replacing the fencing at the front of the site to make it more secure and we are considering installing CCTV. We have submitted a planning application to Elmbridge regarding the Fencing at the front of the site. This is still ongoing as EBC have requested further information.
